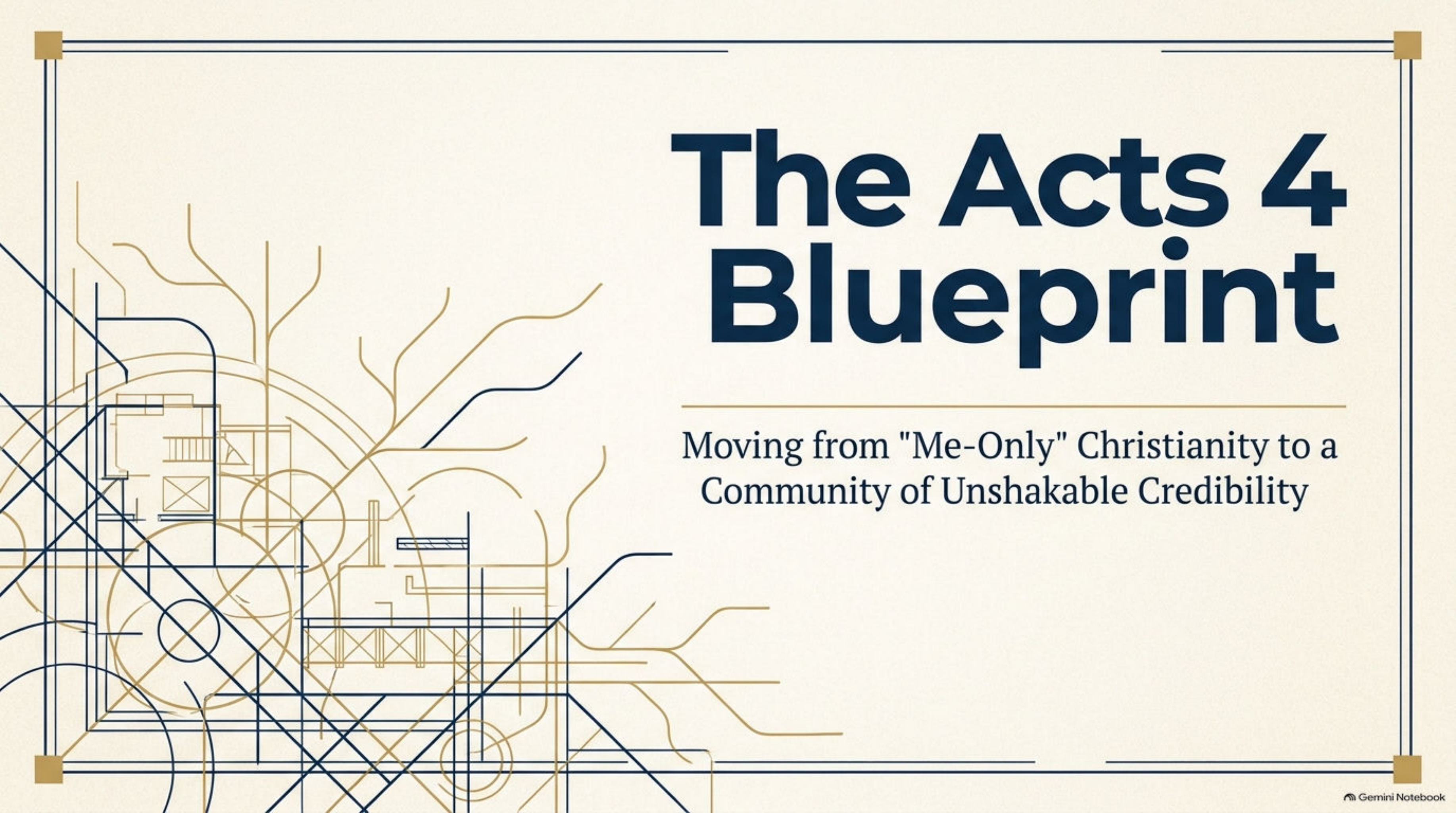
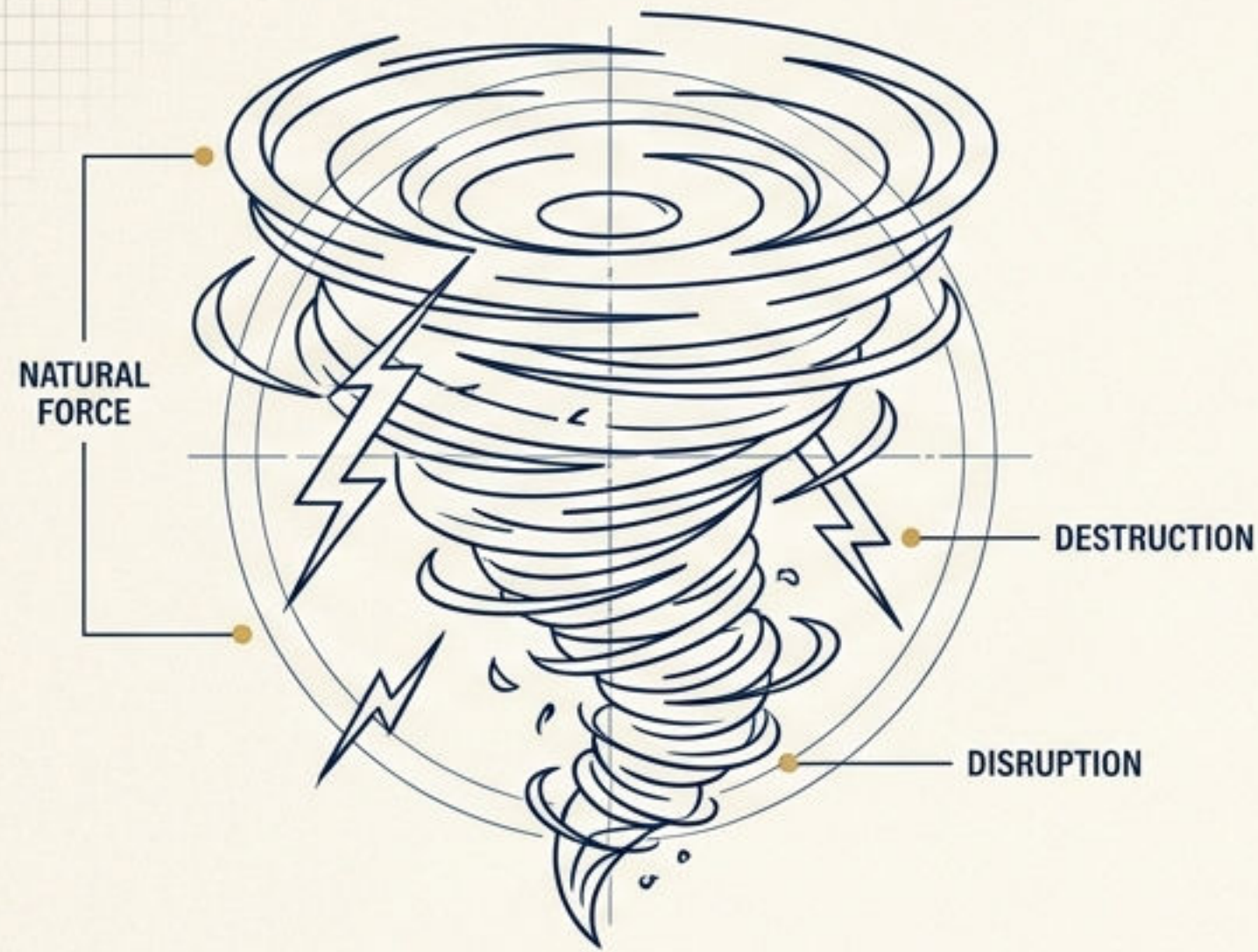




The Acts 4 Blueprint

Over 30 years ago, violent tornadoes swept through central Illinois, destroying eight out of ten buildings in towns like Ogden. Within hours, hundreds of volunteers arrived. Differences were forgotten; people worked side-by-side for a common goal.

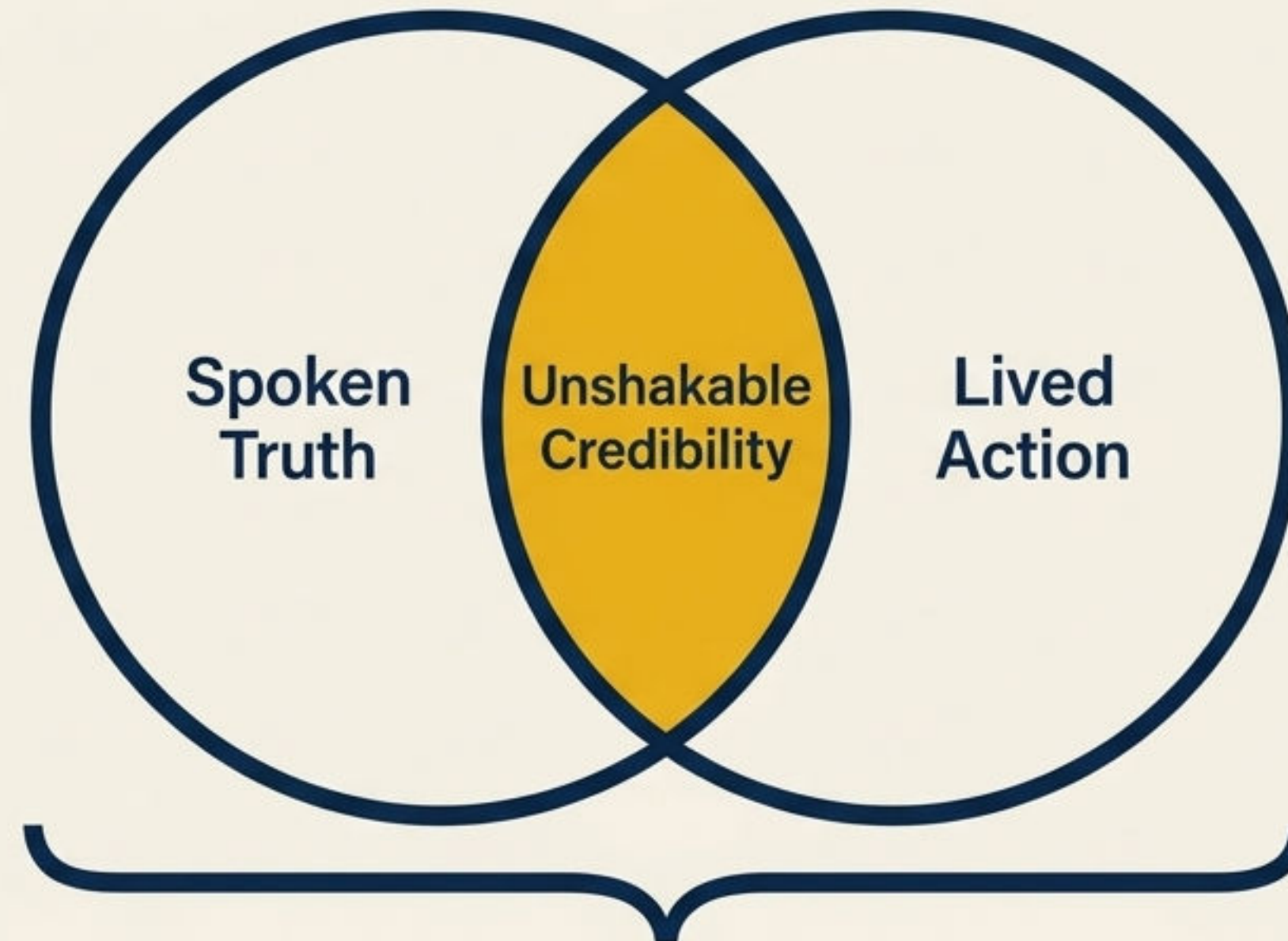


Unity as a **Survival Skill**

The early church faced unexpected, terrifying trials and massive persecution. They **survived because they relied on one another**. We must learn these survival skills now, during peacetime, rather than waiting for a crisis to force our hand.

The Anatomy of Believability

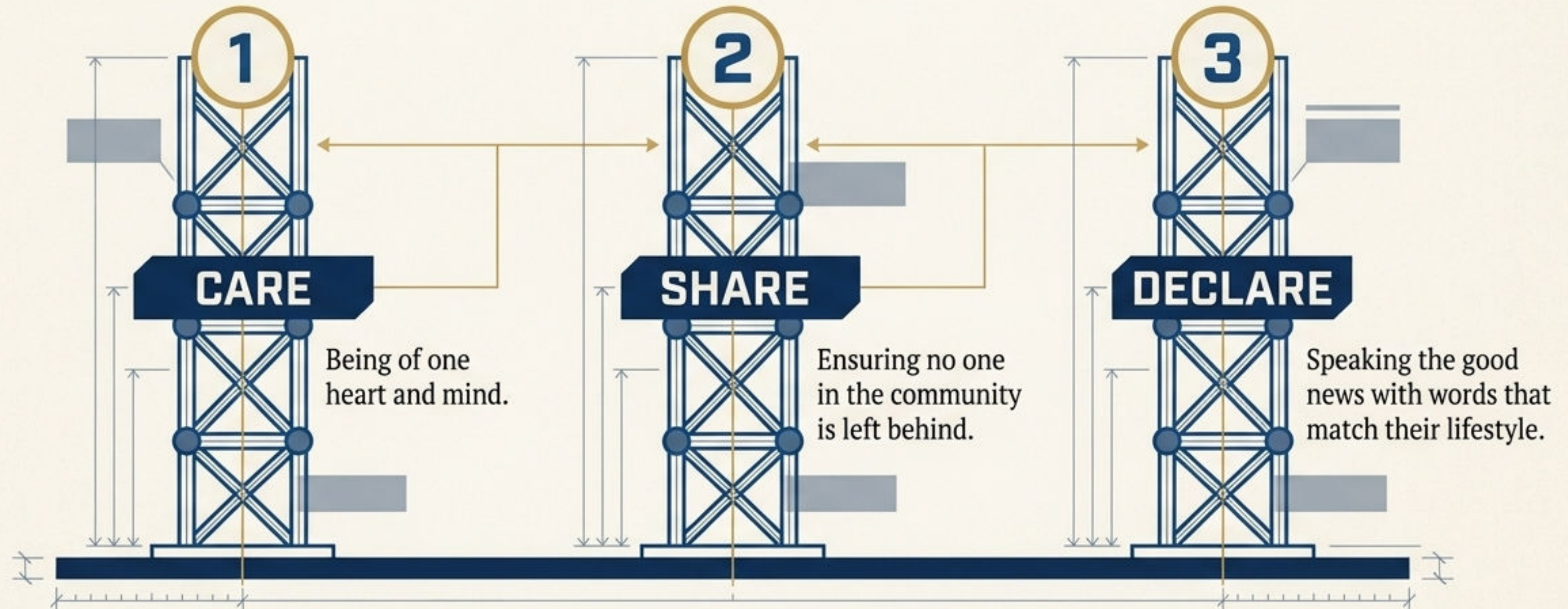
The church is only believable when it practices what it preaches. Our message is entirely undersold if it is not backed by tangible action.

The Three-Part Blueprint of a Healthy Church

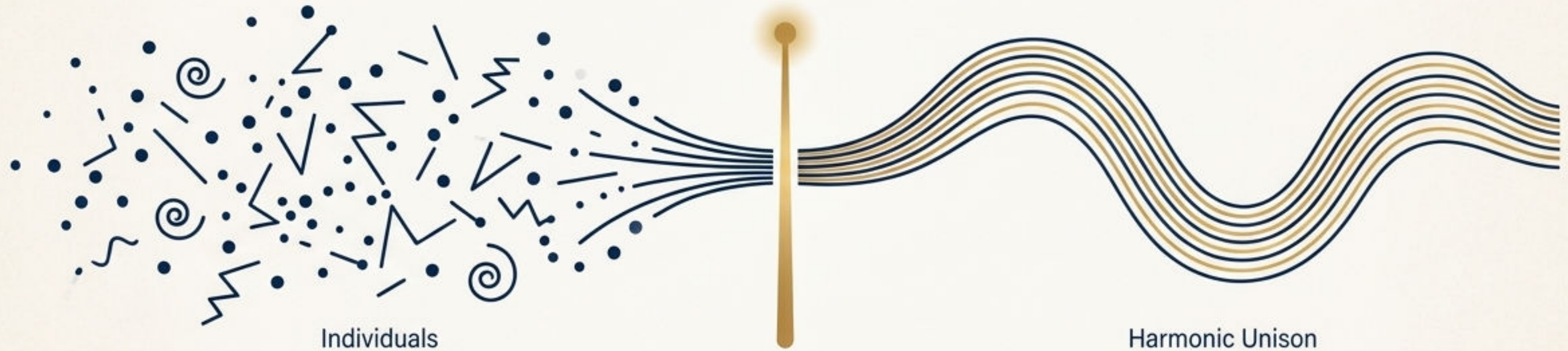
The early church survived intense bullying, persecution, and explosive growth by adhering to a specific structural blueprint found in Acts 4.



The Lexicon of Unity: Homothumodon

In Acts 4, Luke describes the believers as sharing one heart and mind. The original Greek word is *Homothumodon*—moving together in unison.

The Orchestra Alignment Diagram

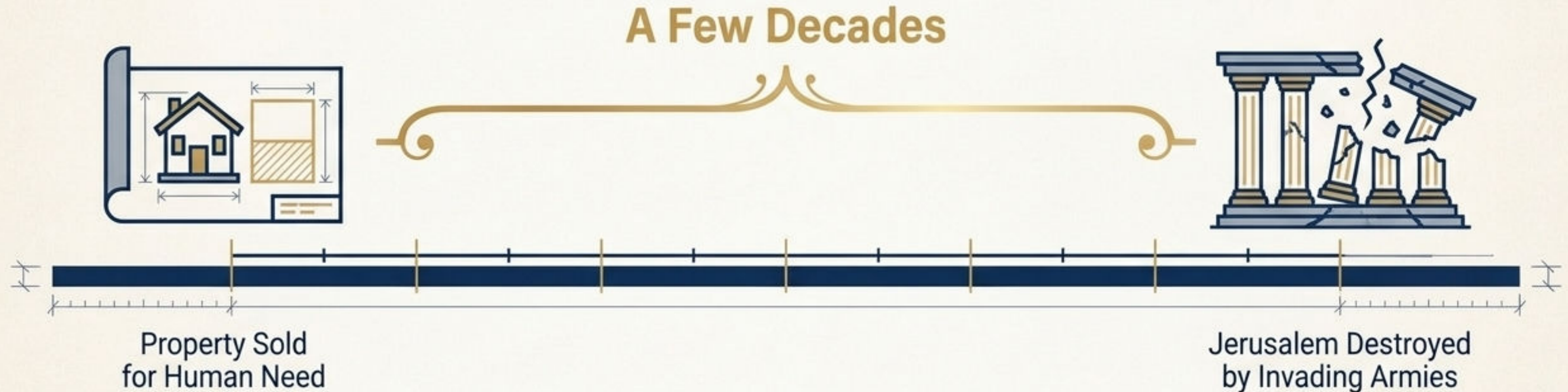


The Orchestra Metaphor

An orchestra is comprised of many different individuals playing entirely different instruments. Yet, they follow the movements of one Conductor (The Holy Spirit) to create beautiful music together. Moving forward together under this guidance is the main trademark of a healthy church.

Trading Temporary Dirt for Human Need

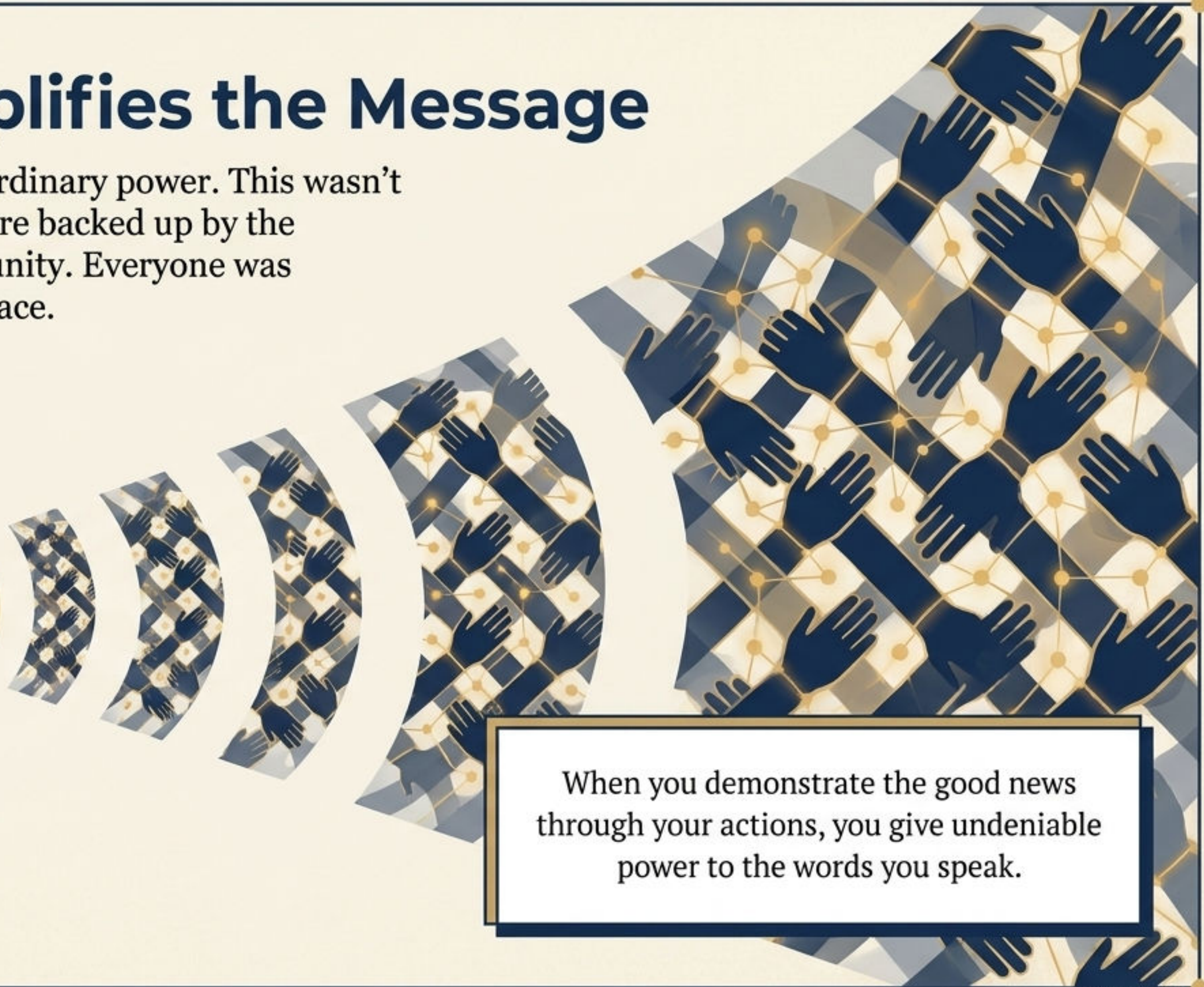
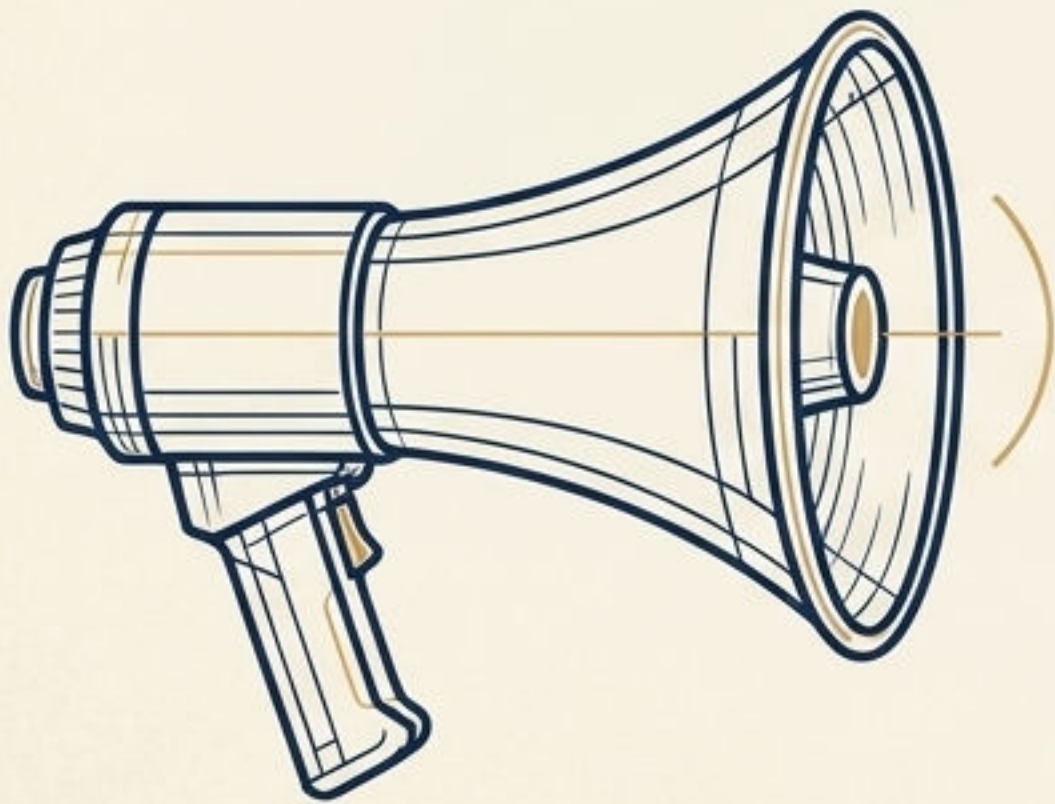
The early church featured a large population of the poor, disabled, and persecuted who were drawn to Jesus's love. Wealthier believers voluntarily sold their real estate to provide for them.



It might have seemed foolish to sell valuable land. But historical reality dictates that just a few decades later, invading armies completely destroyed Jerusalem. They would have lost the land anyway by holding onto it. Instead, they traded "temporary dirt" for eternal human impact.

Generosity Amplifies the Message

The Apostles preached with extraordinary power. This wasn't just rhetorical skill; their words were backed up by the radical, visible deeds of the community. Everyone was surrounded by an extraordinary grace.



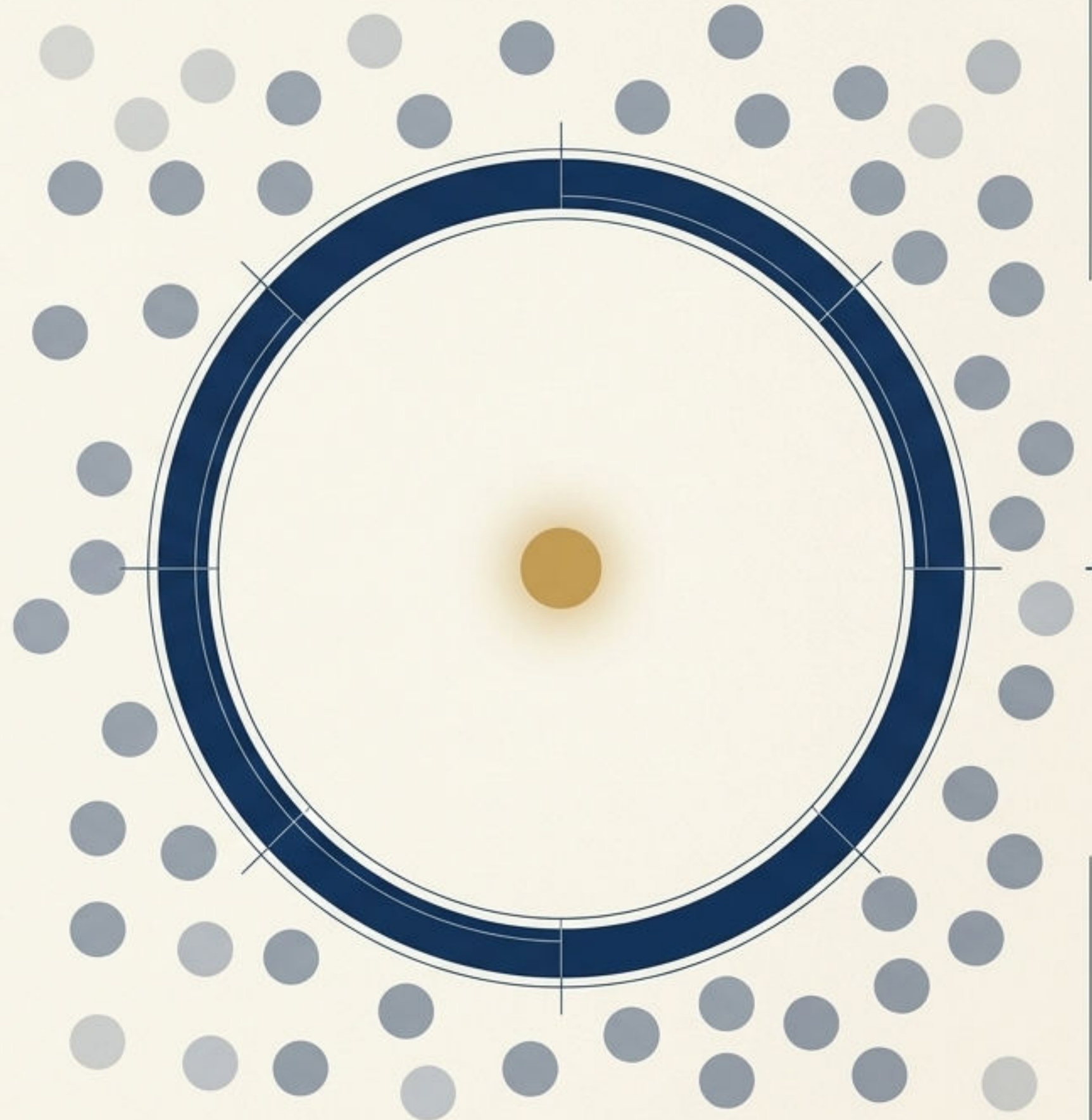
When you demonstrate the good news through your actions, you give undeniable power to the words you speak.

The Danger of “Me-Only” Christianity

Modern culture is obsessed with individualism and personal rights. This reduces the Christian faith to “me-only” terms: my forgiveness, my new life, my inner peace, and how the Bible makes me feel.

A Barna study revealed millions of people who claim to love Jesus rarely associate with others in a church setting, completely filtering out the “family” part of the good news.

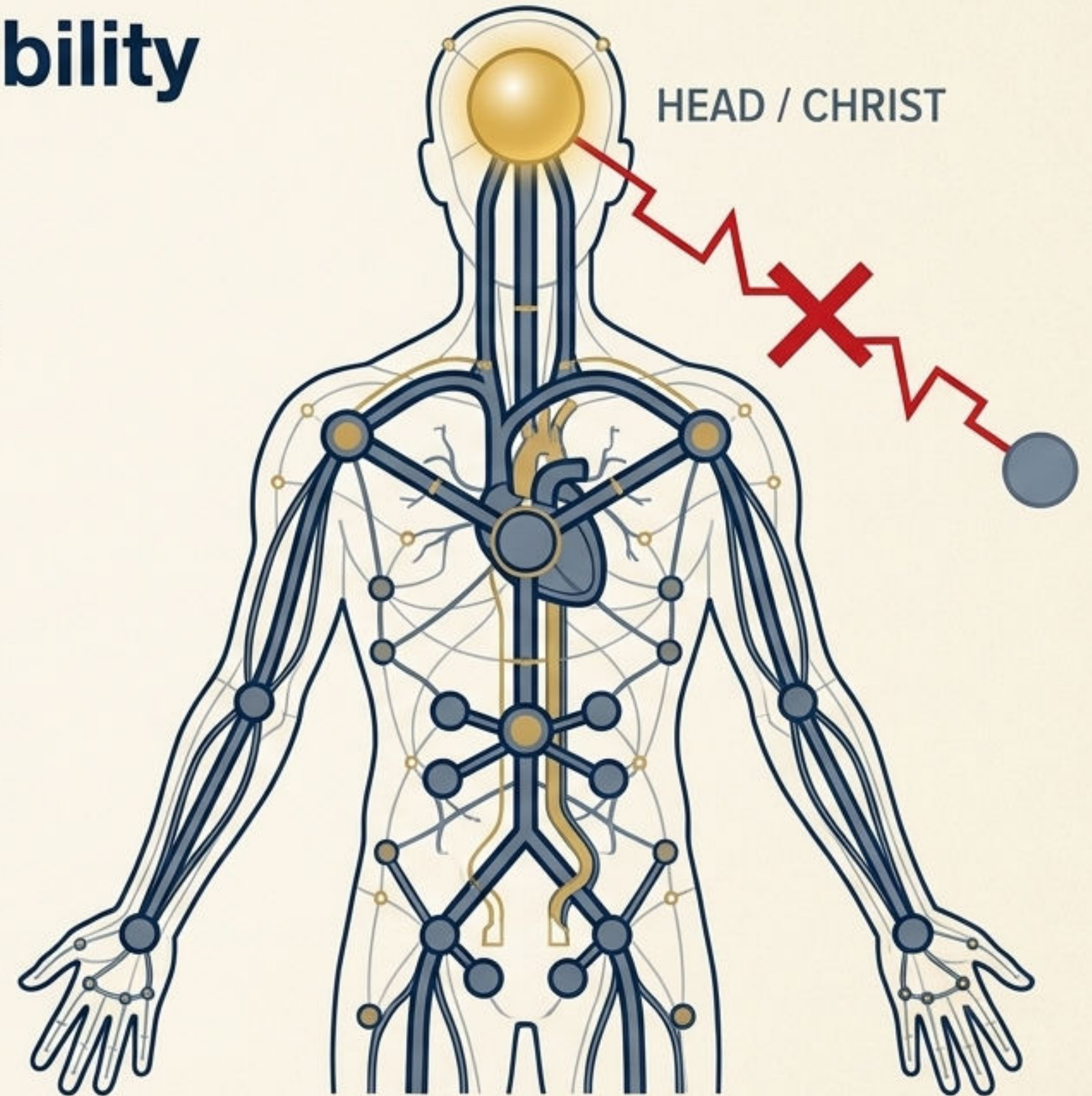
We trade a massive, shared faith for a shrunken, private, homemade version of Christianity that ignores the biblical mandate to be a “holy nation.”



The Theological Impossibility of Isolation

“No part of the body can say to the other, I have no need of you.”

If any part of the body is to be connected to the Head (Christ), it must intrinsically be connected to the other parts of that same body. You can only experience the close friendship of the Holy Spirit if you embrace that same Spirit dwelling in the hearts of your brothers and sisters.



The Culture Clash: Two Divergent Mindsets

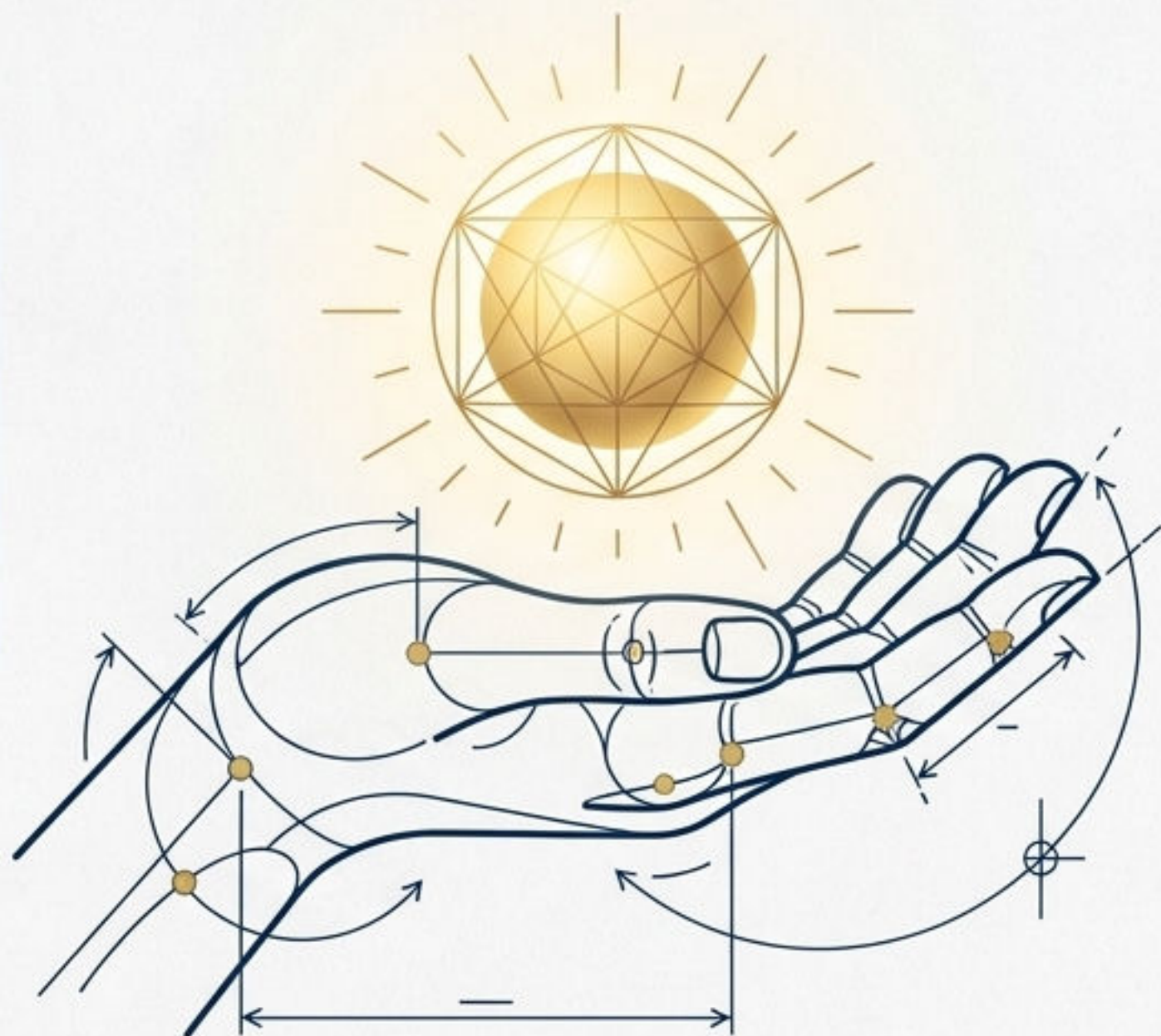
The Cultural Default	The Healthy Church

The early church practiced radical generosity because they recognized a fundamental truth: nothing they owned was truly theirs.

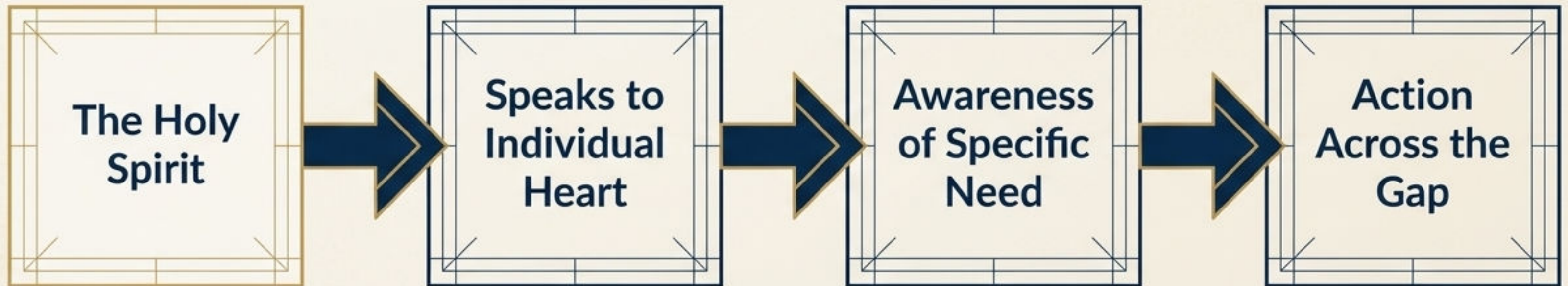
Everything we have has only come into our possession because God placed it there. We are simply temporary managers of His property. God can properly say, 'It's all mine because I made it all.'

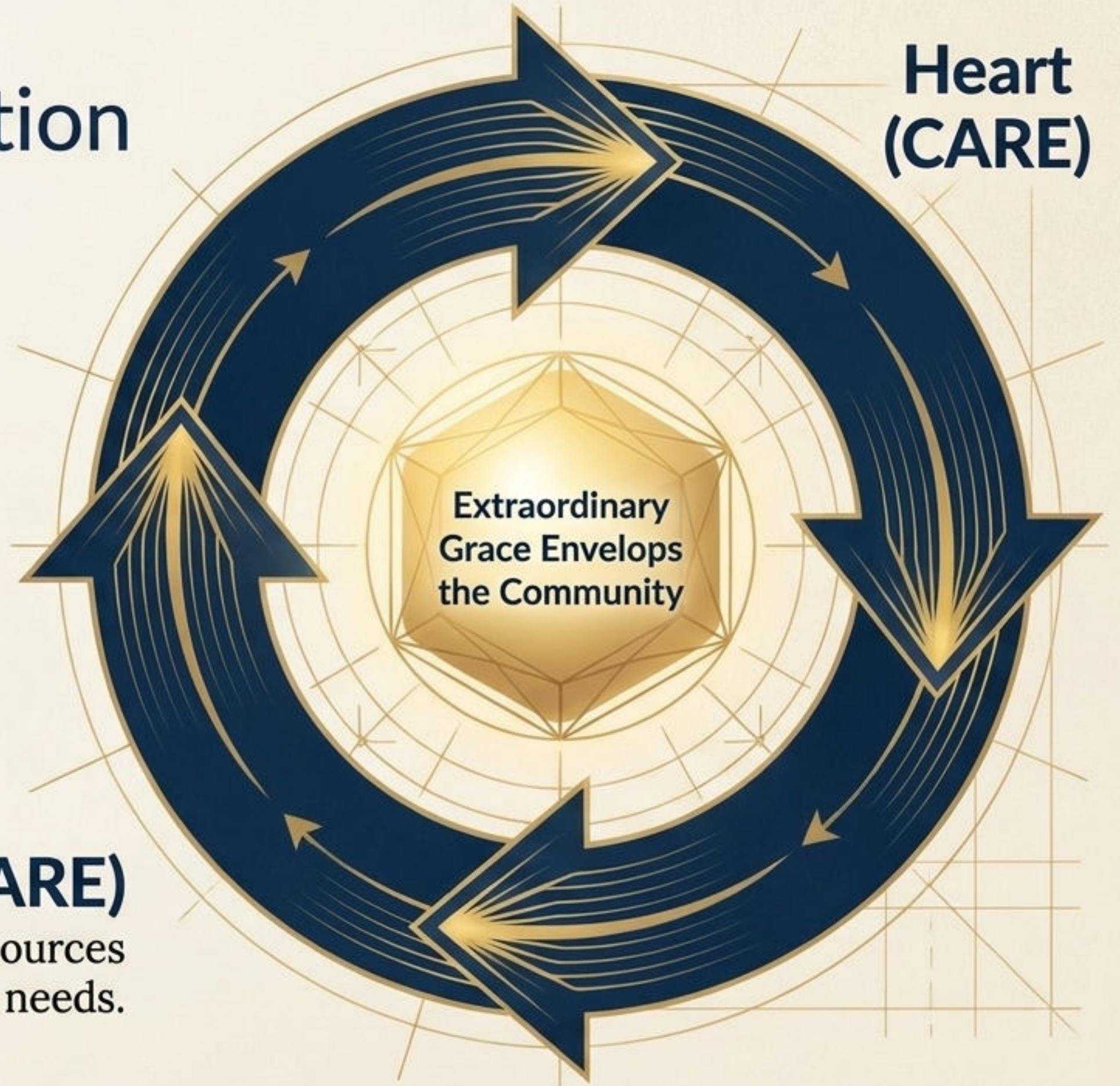


This activity is generated strictly by the Holy Spirit prompting an individual to notice a need and moving them to bridge the space to make a difference.
